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WORDS FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF ELDERS

PASTOR STEVEN CHIN

The Board of Elders (BOE) is the highest ruling body in BCEC. It is “responsible for carrying out the purpose of BCEC by overseeing the spiritual growth of BCEC through articulating and teaching Biblical doctrines; providing discipleship training and discipline; developing vision, philosophy of ministry, and strategic long-term plans for the ministry of BCEC; and determining the staffing needs.” The BOE generally meets on the first and third Thursday nights of each month.

The BOE is currently composed of 11 members: 7 elders who are pastors and 4 lay elders. The pastors are Pastors Steven Chin, Daniel Chan, Kenneth Kwong, Enoch Liao, Andy Su, Barry Lam, and Ken Liu. The lay elders are Brian Hui, Chuk-lam Yuen, Jack Lee, and Bak Fun Wong.

The BOE spent time this past year dealing with a number of issues, including the following:

- **MINISTRY PLANNING**, including developing the annual churchwide theme and reviewing the ministries for each of



seven congregations through an analysis of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats.

- **PERSONNEL**, including hiring and installation of the Newton English Pastor, the hiring of a Newton Student Ministries Director, and the hiring of an interim Newton Mandarin minister, the continued development of a short-term and long-term plan for staffing, and continued succession planning, as we anticipate the

eventual retirement of the senior pastor and lay elders.

- **EXPANSION PLANNING**, especially for our facilities needs in Chinatown where five different building are currently used. Aspects of Chinatown facilities planning include strategizing for spiritual and numerical growth for our three language groups, the programming and financial feasibility of any physical expansion and consolidation, and projecting the future of

the community surrounding our church and considering the needs in other communities.

- CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES with regards to working with the Board of Deacons to consider improvements to our congregational meetings and voting, in light of the complex nature of our church, and to consider adding a probation period for new pastors.
- TEAM BUILDING and self-evaluation by studying and discussing together *Five Dysfunctions of a Team*

Please continue to pray for the Board of Elders that it will, with unity, discern the Lord's leading in some important decisions in the coming days.

We are thankful for the generosity of all those who have supported BCEC, regardless if it was a service in love, a prayer behind the scene, or a financial offering. We continue to be encouraged by the sacrificial dedication of our fellow brothers and sisters in their giving. Whenever the BOD felt concerned about meeting our financial needs, we experienced God being Jehovah-Jireh in the giving. Even though the General Fund giving did not meet the budget goal, the annual giving in this fiscal year was more than 9% above 2017 giving, and we did not run a deficit at the end of the fiscal year.



Newton Campus continues to go through a phrase of transition, but we are grateful that God has brought three new pastoral staff members to serve His church. Pastor Ken Liu (English Pastor), Saul Lee (Student Ministries Director), and Patrick Lin (Interim Assistant to the Pastor) were all hired during this past ministry year. Our maintenance technician at Newton Campus, Kan Li, left us earlier this year, so we are hoping to hire a new technician to fill his absence. Let us continue

to pray that, through all the changes, Newton Campus will continue to flourish by God's grace and serve the community at Newton.

We have also formed a taskforce to evaluate our Annual Meeting procedures and study how to better mobilize and engage all of our members to participate. This year, we will be using simulcast to host the Annual Meeting at both the Chinatown and Newton campuses. It is our prayer that more people will come together as one body in Christ, understand our church's growing needs, and help build God's kingdom.

As we look ahead to our next ministry year, we see many challenges and opportunities ahead. One of them concerns our Chinatown campus and how we foresee its growth in the future. We have worked closely with the expansion taskforce and Board of Elders on the application of Planned Development Area, which, thanks to God, was approved by the City in October. The PDA gives us flexibility in developing 120 Shawmut Ave. to make

room for our current ministries and beyond, opening the door to dreams and possibilities of new ministries. We will also continue the discussion with the City concerning the possible acquisition of 249 Harrison Ave. for the future high school location. All these are at a preliminary stage, but they can potentially have significant impact to our church, its ministries, and our financial responsibilities. May God give us guidance as we study all the information and keep us close to Him through the process.

I encourage everyone to continue to pray for BCEC, as we work together to offer the hope and peace of the gospel to our neighbors. May we live out our new church theme, "Seek the Peace of the City," and be His witness in the community God has placed us.

REPORT FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

As I write this report, I am actually on sabbatical. I want to start by thanking the church for this sabbatical. I was so busy that I realized how much I needed to rest and to be renewed. The sabbatical has been a much needed blessing to slow down me down and to hear God's voice. I also want to thank all of the pastoral staff and other leaders, especially Pastor Daniel Chan, who have had to pick up additional duties during my sabbatical.

This past year our theme was "Following Jesus Together: Celebrating our Unity in Diversity." We had our first churchwide picnic in years. But true unity comes when we can work together in building up the church despite our language and cultural barriers. The Psalmist wrote in Psalm 133:1 (ESV) "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity!" This requires patience, perseverance, and appreciation of the valuable differences that others bring. Although there will always be challenges, I am

glad to see the different parts of our church working to build up the church.

We may not all be in one place doing the same thing, but, for instance, I see a core of our English-speaking members sacrificing their time and energy to work with middle school students for most of the summer in Project Destiny. (In fact, people have been serving in this ministry for 25 years now. We thank the Lord for the many lives that have been touched). I also see many Chinese-speaking members at the August Moon Festivals in Chinatown and in Quincy and other evangelistic outreaches, engaging people in conversations about the gospel. The target groups may differ, and the methods may vary, but all are trying to share the love of Christ.

In terms of numbers, our adult worship attendance is still at a plateau. We are down about 100 people from our all time high of 1,159 in average attendance in 2011-12 to 1,050 in this past year. Certainly, this

reflects national trends in our changing spiritual environment. Also, there have been a number of new churches started in the area in the past ten years. Some of our former members have gone to serve there, and we bless them. Other factors include more travel by members, more competing activities for children on Sunday morning, and the availability of online sermons. As result some of our members are coming to church services less frequently. We must make worshipping together a priority. As we are reminded in Hebrews 10:25 (NIV), "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another — and all the more as you see the Day approaching." We also hope that the addition of new staff at Newton Campus will give all our staff more time and help lift us off the current plateau. Of course, we need to all to pray and work towards building up His church.

We thank the Lord for providing and leading our church in terms of our facilities in Chinatown. We have been using five different buildings on a typical Sunday in Chinatown. The school rental agreements are short term and subject to change. Over the years, I have seen God's hand of provision as doors closed. The land swap proposal involving Parcel A behind 249 Harrison Ave. was stalled for many years. Then God opened the door for us to purchase 120 Shawmut Ave. We also tried to buy the Holy Trinity Church property next door as it became available, but a developer outbid us. But later the property on the other side was sold also, and the developer invited us to participate in a Planned Development Area (PDA) that allowed special zoning for our properties that includes allowing greater height. After a lengthy process, the PDA was granted this past summer. We thank the Lord and all those who helped and prayed. In addition, the city of Boston has expressed interest in purchasing our 249 Harrison Ave.

property for a new school. At this point, we do not know exactly what the Lord wants us to do. But we can trust that He will provide for us and guide us. Let us all keep this important matter in prayer as it will affect our church's future for generations.

Finally, our theme for the new year is "Seek the Peace of the City." The theme is based on Jeremiah 29:7 (NIV) "Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper." This command from the Lord was given to the Jewish people, as they were carried away to Babylon in captivity. Instead of showing hostility to their captors, He tells them to be a blessing. As we live in a culture more hostile to Christianity, our tendency is to withdraw from the society we live in or to fight against it. But God wants us to be a positive influence, not just to be against the sin we see. There are many ways we can do this by being good neighbors and good citizens. Of course, the

greatest blessing would be to share the life-giving gospel of Christ. As we explore this theme in the coming year, I hope that our church will be an instrument of the Lord to bless our neighbors and our community, so that they will receive the Shalom that comes from the Prince of Peace.

REPORT FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

This year, the Chinese congregations strived towards living out BCEC's theme of the 2018 year, namely "Following Jesus Together: Celebrating Our Unity in Diversity." Each church member devoted greater effort in getting more familiar with other congregations' characters and needs. In particular, through activities such as the Ping Pong Tournament, the churchwide picnic, and various joint fellowship gatherings, a deeper level of collaborations and conversations were fostered.

Regarding our church personnel, since the departure of Minister Peter Wong last year, we had a difficult time looking for an appropriate replacement to shepherd the Newton Mandarin congregation. Thanks to God's provision, in the middle of this year, we came across Minister Patrick Lin. Beginning in August, he joined our team as a part-time minister, and plans on converting to full time

towards the end of next year. Minister Lin has accumulated much experience in life, and is certain of God's calling for him. We look forward to witnessing God's work through him in promoting our church's ministry and shepherding the Newton Campus alongside with Pastors Ken Liu and Barry Lam, and Minister Saul Lee (who also joined our team in August).

Brother Ben Wong served as a part-time seminary student intern in the Chinese congregation this past year. As he graduated from the seminary in May, upon BECE's invitation, Ben will continue to serve as in the full-time capacity of pastoral resident for a year.

With Pastor Steve Chin being on sabbatical leave from June 15th to October 15th, I have been wearing three hats all at the same time — as Deputy Senior Pastor, as a Chinese congregation Pastor, and as a

substitute pastor for the Newton Mandarin congregation. Praise God! Our coworkers shared the additional workload together and helped me on various fronts to maintain seamless operations at BCEC.

There was a significant decline in the attendance throughout all services in the Chinese congregation, and I find the statistics stunningly alarming. Over the past winter season, there were four snowy Sundays. Though none of the services were cancelled, it affected the average general attendance. However, in the prior year, the general attendance had not been influenced when we faced similar snowy and cold weather that led to two cancelled Sunday services. On another note, the congregation size has been shrinking as well, upon which we must reflect carefully. The pertinent numbers are tabulated below on the next page:

Up till September, 23 people from the Chinese congregation were baptized (compared to 27 people last year). Approximately 6 people were baptized during hospital visitations.

REPORT FROM THE EXPANSION TASKFORCE

MARK HO

Praise God for His guidance through the Planned Development Area (PDA) submission process over the past two years. The PDA is a zoning application that enhances our property at 120 Shawmut Ave. Thank you for your prayers, participation in meetings, and for some, publicly sharing your testimonies of God's grace and blessing to you, our church, and our community. On July 12, 2018, the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) approved the PDA proposal that our church is part of.

"Many are the plans in the mind of a man, but it is the purpose of the Lord that will stand. (Prov. 19:21)." Since the Chinatown Expansion effort started 20+ years ago, God has continued to show us that He has a purpose for BCEC. The acquisition of 120 Shawmut Ave. came after challenges with the land swapping plan, the loss of the bid for the former Holy Trinity Church next to 120 Shawmut Ave., and the long wait and uncertainty of the PDA approval. We continue

to see God leading us forward, and along the way, showing us His people in the midst of where He has placed our church.

The approved PDA will enable the possibility of consolidating all of our Chinatown ministries, currently in five different buildings on Sunday, onto one site, as well as to provide more opportunities for us to serve the community. The PDA approval enables us to redevelop 120 Shawmut Ave. and construct a new 12-story building, containing approximately 161,516 square feet of gross floor area, with approximately 84 residential units, two sanctuaries, a gymnasium, fitness rooms, offices, classrooms, meeting space for Christian education, recreational, and social services uses, approximately 2,000 square feet of ground floor commercial space, and a single level underground garage with approximately 30 parking spaces. The residential units are intended to help fund the development of the church and community service space.

Independently, the City of Boston has approached us about the potential acquisition of our original church building at 249 Harrison Ave. These discussions are ongoing. According to the preliminary communications, the City will compensate us for the property based on current real estate prices, cover our relocation costs, as well as provide us with temporary space in the area while we vacate 249 Harrison Ave. and construct the new building at 120 Shawmut Ave., if we proceed in rebuilding. These financial compensations are structured based on the current market rate. We are still waiting for the official offer. We will share when appropriate.

Of all the plans we made, never did we imagine the PDA and the timing of the City's interest of 249 Harrison Ave. For many years, God has provided 249 Harrison Ave. to us as a home to serve and worship Him, and many lives have been changed through the ministries there. Many have been baptized or married there, and countless ministry

meetings have been held there. Today, a majority of the ministries have moved to other more suitable spaces, with the exception of two Sunday services and a few ministry groups. We have outgrown that space for many years. Although space is a critical element of how we run our ministries and community services, it is the ministry plans that drive the usage. Our Elders have been discussing ministry plans in conjunction with how we should proceed in the planning of potentially rebuilding 120 Shawmut Ave. as well as the sales of 249 Harrison Ave. At the same time, we are also researching the financial feasibility of rebuilding.

Any future expansion activities will be voted on by the leadership (BOE and BOD), as well as the congregation. Please continue to pray for our leaders, as we study the different options for future expansion. Pray that God will make clear to us His purpose for BCEC, our ministries, and how to care for His people.



A few months ago, leaders from the Cantonese 3rd service proposed the idea of merging the 2nd and 3rd services. This received a positive response by ministry leaders from both services. However, the plan for expansion at Chinatown Campus remains unclear at the moment, and its various options will sig-

nificantly impact the possibility of the merger. Therefore, the idea is still in the stage of exploration.

We have more and more brothers and sisters facing these problems, but we also witnessed how they relied on God for His help. His grace is sufficient for us. Their faith in God and their courage are admirable. They also demonstrated the following of the command of God in 1 Timothy 5:8 for each to provide for their own household. I hope that each one of us will continue to pray for one another and support one another. 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CHINATOWN MANDARIN CONGREGATION

This past year, we collectively experienced God's unifying grace throughout different congregations and throughout BCEC.

First, it was through the third annual Staff Appreciation dinner held at the end of last year. Besides inviting the staff and elders, we were able to invite all the deacons of the church who had been left out in prior years. We thanked God for using our church leaders to shepherd us and transform us culturally. One member of our congregation shared at the dinner, "We as a congregation could not be where we are today without all of you. We want to thank you for not just doing these acts of service, but doing them in a Christ-like way. By serving us with kindness and patience, with diligence and faithfulness, and as humble servant-leaders. Over the years, we think your example of leadership has also gradually helped to change the culture of the Mandarin congregation. Thank God for your generosity and sacrifice that we may be built up. Secondly, this summer we participated in the Chinese Joint Retreat. It was the first time

for the Chinatown Mandarin congregation to join in the Chinese Joint Retreat. Three generations of old, middle, and young participated. We especially thank the Cantonese co-workers who diligently labored and shouldered the many administrative responsibilities in preparation for the retreat. The retreat theme this year was "How to follow the Lord in the 21st Century." One young member from our congregation shared, "At the time, I thought this is exactly what we as young adults need to learn. In the two days of the retreat, I was able to join with lively brothers and sisters of all ages in preparing our hearts to grow in the Lord. This was something I had never experienced before. It truly felt like we all belonged to one warm family — we ate together, lived together, and hiked in the woods together. Together, we learned how to make a straight path for the Lord."

Furthermore, we attended the first churchwide picnic in 25 years. It brought together all seven congregations and led brothers and sisters from the Mandarin congregation to experience a "taste" of unity.

When we played together — everything from volleyball to shuttlecock to frisbee — we realized that interacting with brothers and sisters who spoke another language was not that scary. On the contrary, it was very fun. The feeling that everyone belonged to one family was wonderful. Even though there were many people we had never met before, we did not feel any barriers among us.

Recently, we had a chance to make preparations for engaging with an American church in Quincy — to collectively respond to God's call to join hands in reviving the gospel together. Through this American church, God reminded us of the urgency in sharing the gospel and making disciples. An elderly sister from that American church joined our Chinese Bible study that was held there. She shared with us, "This American church really has a heart for God's kingdom. They eagerly hoped for us to join them, so that the gospel can be shared with the Chinese-speaking neighbors in their vicinity. May the Lord touch the hearts of our brothers and sisters, that we may with hearts of thanksgiving and in unity advance the gospel." Timothy Fellowship

"We see in the Bible that although Isaac experienced in his youth the sacrificial event by his father Abraham and witnessed with his own eyes his father's fear and reverence for the Lord, he still faltered in his old age and did not revere God. Faith may be lost in just one generation. May the Lord have mercy on us, that we may be vigilant."

Over the past year, God led the Chinatown Mandarin congregation to dive deeper into His Word and to grow together in unity. May He continue to lead us to be renewed culturally and grow together to have a vision for His Kingdom.
