

I praise God, that He has allowed us to be part of His plan for His kingdom in Chinatown with His timing. I am so excited to partner with you, my brothers and sisters, to work through the coming hurdles we face in order to grow ourselves and to grow His kingdom. To God be all the glory!

BOARD OF ELDERS - Steven Chin

The Board of Elders (BOE) is the highest ruling body in BCEC. It is "responsible for carrying out the purpose of BCEC by overseeing the spiritual growth of BCEC through articulating and teaching Biblical doctrines; providing discipleship training and discipline; developing vision, philosophy of ministry, and strategic long-term plans for the ministry of BCEC; and determining the staffing needs."

The BOE is currently composed of 9 members: 5 elders who are pastors and 4 lay elders. The pastors are Pastors Steven Chin, Daniel Chan, Thomas Lee, Kenneth Kwong, and Enoch Liao. The lay elders are Brian Hui, Chuk-lam Yuen, Jack Lee, and Bak Fun Wong.

The BOE usually has two meetings a month and has an additional meeting once a quarter for long term planning. The BOE spent considerable time this past year dealing a number of issues including the following:

Theology including divorce and doctor assisted suicide

- Personnel including promotion decisions, ordination decisions, and hiring decisions
- Ministry planning including annual church wide themes and Newton Mandarin congregation planning
- Expansion especially related to the acquisition of 120 Shawmut Ave.
- Church discipline
- Long term planning including a constitutional amendment proposal, vision clarification, understanding the future of the ethnic church, dealing with growing complexity of BCEC, and clarifying pastoral staff and BOE relationship.

Please continue to pray for the Board of Elders. Pray for wisdom and discernment to know the Lord's leading for our church into the future especially as our church grows in complexity. Pray for continued unity in making decisions for the church.

FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

Steven Chin

We thank the Lord for an exciting year when we have seen God working to provide for our church in different ways. This past year God allowed us to take a major step in acquiring ministry space in Chinatown. We initially started to look for more space for ministry in Chinatown over 15 years ago. But it seemed we were impeded by different obstacles to expand in Chinatown. I am sure many of us felt very frustrated by the lack of progress.



But, unexpectedly about a year ago, God opened the door for us to acquire South Cove Manor's building at 120 Shawmut Ave. We recognize that we could not have done this without the Lord's intervention. Available large space in the Chinatown area is very rare. Even if space were available, it would be difficult for us to compete with developers in terms of price and quick decision making. Yet the Lord guided the process so that we were selected to be the buyer at a price we could afford. Already, we see new buildings going up around the area indicating the timeliness of our purchase and the new opportunities for outreach.

I want to thank the Expansion Committee that did a lot of work in a short period time that culminated in the congregation voting overwhelmingly to buy 120 Shawmut Ave. on June 16, 2013. I also want to thank all our members that prayed and gave sacrificially over the years toward the expansion despite the uncertainty and lack of progress at certain times.

Even after acquiring 120 Shawmut Ave., there is still much to be done and to pray for. (The closing of the sale is expected to be in the second quarter of 2014) The building at 120 Shawmut Ave. is suited for fellowship activities, meetings, and classes. However, it will not provide large worship space without a lot of costly renovation. The selection of a new mayor may have an impact on us as well. We need to pray for wisdom for our leadership to discern how best to proceed in renovating 120 Shawmut Ave. and in providing for the necessary worship space in Chinatown. We will need to raise more money no matter how we plan to add worship space in Chinatown. As God has blessed you, I hope you will begin to set aside additional financial resources to provide the necessary ministry space for the next generation.

The Lord has also provided for the church in terms of pastoral staff. We will miss Phil Chew, Adult Ministries Director for our Chinatown English congregation, who has moved to a new ministry in California. However, God helped us to hire three new pastoral staff this past year. Adding new staff is always a critical decision for our church. In the past year we have taken a deliberate process to try to make the best decisions possible regarding who would lead important ministries.

Calvin Chu was hired in July 2013 as Student Ministry Director for the Chinatown English congregation. He will oversee the huge middle school, high school, and college ministries. Peter Wong was hired in September 2013 as Assistant to the Pastor. He will work under Pastor Daniel Chan to start a new Mandarin congregation in Newton, which would be our church's 7th congregation. We praise the Lord that the Newton campus started ten years ago with Cantonese and English congregations. With the help of some hard working brothers and sisters, we see the potential to reach out to Mandarin speaking in the Newton area. Steve Liu was also hired in September 2013 to be the Project Destiny Ministries Director. In celebrating the 20th anniversary of Project Destiny, we have reviewed how this ministry has produced much fruit in terms of young people coming to Christ and people developed as servant leaders. I am glad to see our financial commitment to this wonderful outreach ministry.

All three of our new staff have served in our church in the past and can be considered internal hires. We rejoice that our church has helped to produce servant leaders who want to devote their lives to serving the Lord. We need to support their sacrifice with our prayers and financial support. Indeed our church budget will increase with more staff and with more repair and maintenance costs for our buildings in Newton and in Chinatown. Let us continue to pray, serve, and give as the Lord enables us to support the growth of our church.

In addition to new space for ministry in the near future and new staff, the Lord has continued to bless the church's ministry. Despite a more difficult spiritual environment and people moving away, the church attendance has been fairly steady. Our average total attendance for our six worship services has been 1142 (compared to 1159 in the previous year.) Our baptisms remain strong at 75 (compared to 75 in the previous year). For the English speaking ministries, total attendance has declined slightly from 436 to 408 from last year, but baptisms have increased from 21 to 29. We thank the Lord for His continued blessings.

The church had a church wide theme for the first time in many years. Spiritual Disciplines was chosen to encourage our members to adopt practices that are conducive to spiritual growth whether it be Bible reading, prayer, or some other practice. In the new ministry year starting in September, discipleship is the new church wide theme. Discipleship means actively following Jesus and becoming like Him in the way we think, feel, and act. As we intentionally train people to grow to be like Christ, we hope to fulfill our part in the Great Commission (Mt. 28:18-20)

Finally I want to thank all the people who have prayed, given, and served in the past year. As you read this annual ministry report you will learn how God is blessing by changing lives in different parts of the church. I know many of you have personally sacrificed your time, talent, and treasures for God's kingdom. May the Lord bless you to see the fruits of your labors in Christ.

WORDS FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

The Lord has been guiding and blessing BCEC Chinese ministry in the past year. I took my third sabbatical leave until October last year. But the Chinese ministry continued to progress until the leadership of the Chinese Staff and elders.

To augment our church-wide theme of "Spiritual Discipline," we started a book study campaign. Through our fellowships, Sunday school class and small groups, we studied the book The Life You Always Wanted. The feedbacks are very positive and we plan to do similar campaigns in the future.

We are very satisfied with the first year of Stephen Ministry. Eight Stephen Ministers and two trainers took up caring for many members who needed longer term caring. We recruited one more trainer this year and we plan to start the training of a second batch of Stephen Ministers soon.



After more than a year of need assessment, recruitment, screening and interviewing, we are happy to have added a second Mandarin minister to our pastoral staff. Besides taking care of Newton Mandarin ministry, Minister Peter Wong will also work with Minister Andy Su to grow BCEC Mandarin ministry as a whole. Vivian Cheung started taking a two-year leave of absence in January, 2012 to care for her family member. She has confirmed to rejoin the Chinese Staff in February, 2014.

Chinese ministry as a whole experienced a small growth quantitatively. The following are statistics for the attendance of the Chinese services:

In addition, there are 30 to 50 Mandarin speaking adults participating in various Mandarin gatherings every Sunday. The Lord willing, we will formally start a Newton Mandarin congregation—the 7th congregation—soon.

Including the September, 2013 baptismal service, 46 People received baptism through the Chinese ministry last year, a slight drop from 54 people the year before.

EXPANSION PROJECT UPDATE - A CONTINUED JOURNEY OF FAITH…

We want to praise the Lord for blessing our church with numerical growth so that physical expansion is necessary. Praise Him for leading us in the current expansion journey which began way back in 1996. Owning only the buildings at 249 Harrison Ave. and 237 Harrison Ave., we struggled to accommodate the 700 adults plus children, who regularly attending church at the time. Some leaders went to Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and obtained a verbal agreement to an equal land swap with us on Parcel A which is the lot behind the church. However, in 1999, the Boston Public School department decided to place temporary classrooms for the new Quincy Upper School (QUS) on Parcel A. After 14 years those temporary classrooms continue to be there to this day and have prevented us from moving forward with the land swap.

Unable to expand in Chinatown, our church became more open to expand in the suburbs as our congregation grew to 1100. In 2003, the church bought 218 Walnut St. in Newton and started a Cantonese worship and an English worship there.

Even with the purchase of the Newton campus, our Chinatown congregations continued to grow. To relieve the space shortage, we requested of the Boston School Department and were granted permission to rent the Quincy Elementary School (QES).. Renting the auditorium, cafeteria, gym, and 26 classrooms eased our space needs on Sunday mornings. However, we have never been able to obtain a long term lease. Ministry leaders grapple with the setup and teardown on each before and after use of space.

We continued to raise money for our Expansion Fund to be ready if the QUS moved off Parcel A. Despite a down economy in 2009, our members with God's help pledged over \$8 million for expansion.

In 2012 we learned that there are legal issues complicating Parcel A, further delaying the land swap plan. In the spring, our church held a 21 Days of Prayer Initiative. We studied how the faith of Nehemiah and others helped them overcome opposition and obstacles, and learned about our God cares and provides for the needs of His people. In the week following the 21 Days of Prayer, BCEC leaders and representatives from South Cove Manor (SCM) met to discuss the possibility of acquiring SCM, a building located in 120 Shawmut Ave. which could address many of our space needs. In November we shared with SCM's board of directors about our ministries, our financial resources, and our commitment to Chinatown. As our members prayed fervently, SCM decided to sell their property to BCEC.

On June 16th, BCEC held a Special General Assembly meeting. Praise God for the 400+ brothers and sisters who participated. All six congregations were represented; all generations came. After a time of worship, prayer and information sharing, the congregation voted to acquire 120 Shawmut Avenue. The Expansion Committee and the church leadership are actively discussing and planning on how to use the space as we wait for the closing of the property tentatively targeting mid-2014.

Of behalf of the church, I want to publicly thank the Expansion Committee for all their hard work. People voluntarily worked hard for months negotiating with South Cove Manor, working with the consultants, interpreting the data received, and communicating all the information to over 1000 people in three different languages and multiple campuses. Though some of them had never worked together, especially under stressful condition (deadlines almost every week), I observed servant hearts, joyful spirits, and patient love for one another. I thank the Lord for raising up such a dedicated group of volunteers. Please continue to pray for the Expansion Committee, as there is still much work to be done in the coming months.

Thank you to all our members for their prayers and support. I can see that our people are concerned about the future of the church. They read the expansion handouts, sat through presentations, asked questions, attended the special general assembly, and, most of all...prayed. Since we still do not know the whole plan of how we will use the building, our congregation exhibited faith and trust that the Lord will guide and provide for the future. This was especially shown by the generous contributions to the Expansion Fund even when our expansion plans were uncertain. With God's help, your sacrificial giving allowed us to be able to buy 120 Shawmut Ave. As we acquire the building and make plans about how we will use and renovate it, let us continue to pray for the Lord's guidance and provision for our church.



Introduction

When God is at work in a church, change happens. The 2012-2013 ministry year was no different. I give thanks and praise to God for His faithfulness to our BCEC family, and particularly for what God has been doing in the life of our Chinatown English Congregation. Permit me to offer this Annual Report article along this theme: God Positioning His People for His Future Plans

Getting into Position

In the game of chess, much of the strategy is about the position of the pieces on the board. (Ask Pastor Daniel. He's a chess-playing machine.) Sometimes in life and ministry it seems like God is randomly moving the pieces around. But in hindsight, sometimes the Holy Spirit gives us a hint of understanding as to what God has in store.

Positioning God's Workers

Perhaps the most significant update in the life of our congregation is God repositioning his workers, specifically the church staff. Emily Liu had served faithfully for almost 6 years as the Student Ministry Assistant. Then God saw fit to position her to be a full time mother and wife. Philip Chew has served with dedication for about 8 years. Then God saw fit to position him and his family in a young church out in Los Angeles.

But God also added leaders to our team, even as he positioned others away. We thank God for the addition of Calvin Chu as the Director of Student Ministries, as well as the addition of Steve Liu as the Director of Project Destiny Ministries. God has perfect timing. We thank God for how He moves His workers in His kingdom work.

Positioning God's Church

Obviously, a highlight of this ministry year has also been the Chinatown Expansion project. We rejoice in the progress made towards acquiring the South Cove Manor facility at 120 Shawmut Avenue. Again, God's timing is perfect. We eagerly await what God will do.

Positioning God's Worshippers

Our church theme last year was "Spiritual Disciplines." Along that theme, our congregation considered sermons, Sunday School classes, and other initiatives to cultivate these disciplines that we hope will grow our relationships with the Lord. Plant by the Stream was a brand new initiative in which we challenged the English congregations of both campuses to read a Bible devotional for 21 consecutive days. Praise the Lord over 80% of the participants read for over 80% of the days. And praise the Lord for this small but significant step towards digging deeper into God's Word.

Positioning for the Future

This coming year, I pray that the Lord will move in our congregation in a greater way as we desire to highlight the call to make disciples. As I also have the newly added role of being the Interim Adult Minister, I ask you to pray for us as we seek God's direction for all the adult ministries, including fellowships, small groups, and Christian Education. In the past as I wrote annual reports, I always gave thanks for the growth of the ministries. Whenever I witnessed the effectiveness of the ministries as brothers and sisters grow in the Lord and/or partake in baptism and new friends come to believe God, I was overjoyed. These were all fruits of God's work. However, this year God reminded me of another source of thanksgiving. One Sunday morning, ten minutes before worship service began, I suddenly saw a sister, whom I had not seen for a while, sitting in the last row. Because she had an illness that required long term treatment, she had not attended any church services for some time. When I saw her, her body showed apparent weakness; however, she had a radiant smile on her face. When I went over to welcome her, she said to me: "When my physical body gets better, I will try my best to regularly attend worship services." My heart was moved at that instant. God used this woman to speak to me: despite of her weak body, her desire to worship Him was genuine. Since then, every Sunday as I see brothers and sisters worship God together, I cannot stop giving thanks because every face is dependent on the power of our Lord Jesus' blood and every life is a testimony of God's amazing grace.

In the past year, I saw many brothers and sisters face different struggles. There were health issues, marital problems, parenting challenges, job changes, relational conflicts and ministry difficulties. As a shepherd, I inevitably felt their pain and sadness. However, as we faced these giants in our lives, God allowed us to see something even more important - His grace. As Jesus said to Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness." (II Corinthians 12:9) Christians and non-Christians both would face different giants in our daily living; however, we as God's children could always stand in His grace. Everyone's life is to glorify our Lord Savior Jesus Christ. Our faith is not stagnant but it is challenged and authenticated in everyday realities as we walk with Him. Last year was a time when God tested us. He was refining us so that our faith would be as pure as gold.

This April, we were shaken by the coldness of the Boston marathon bombers. The bombing not only woke us up to see the shortness of life, but also reminded us the urgency of sharing the gospel. The outreach committee used this opportunity to hold an evangelistic meeting within two weeks of the bombing. There were about a hundred people who heard the precious message of the gospel that night. After that, we also changed some weekday Alpha course to Sunday school times. We believe that this change was a more efficient use of our resources and allowed more seekers to come. Since then, the Alpha course has been on Sundays. In addition, we partnered with Chinese Family For Christ and sponsored a three-day Cantonese Marriage Enrichment Retreat. The goal of this retreat was to help husbands and wives to apply biblical truths of marriage bvin their marital relationship. Camp provided effective methods to help spouses to deepen their communications, revolve their conflicts, and enrich their love

towards unity. There were sixteen couples from BCEC and other churches present at the camp. While some were just married, some have been married over thirty years, all benefited from this camp. In the future, we hope that this camp would become a long-term ministry that would help build more solid and godly marriages.

As we set goals for the next year, Newton Cantonese congregation has two needs. First, we need to strengthen our caring ministries. We thank Chinatown's Local Evangelism Department that held a counselor training during Newton's Sunday school hours last year. Now we have established several counselors who are ready to do follow-up work to care for brothers and sisters who are new to the faith. In addition, we hope to strengthen the care and edification within small groups and fellowships. Second, we also need to train lay spiritual leaders to serve together with church staff to build God's kingdom.

Prayer Items:

- 1) May God help us to love Him and love one another with all our hearts.
- 2) May God open the door to the gospel and raise brothers and sisters with sincere desire to share the gospel.
- 3) May God's love fill every family and bless the next generation.
- 4) Pray with thanksgiving for brothers and sisters who are serving. May God continue to use their gifts and give them a joyful heart as they serve.

We are striving to become a spiritual "clan", a family of spiritual families, from 3 congregations whom minister together in equipping our parents and mature people to make disciples of our own children and youth, and mentoring those younger in faith to reach their families and their communities.

CHINATOWN'S CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

The Chinatown Children's Ministry reaches students from BCEC families as well as seekers from the Chinatown community and beyond. Some of the community families come to know BCEC through outreach programs such as the Children's Christmas Party and Vacation Bible School. Many newcomers are invited by our congregation members. Last year, 25% of the elementary students came from non-Christian families. Each week, our teachers and helpers strive to develop relationships with the children and their families.

More and more children are diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder and other learning disabilities each year. In anticipation of our future needs, our volunteers will receive training in this important topic in the coming year.

Nursery

Life Stage: infant to 2 years old

Average attendance for 4 nurseries: 22

We operate a total of 4 nurseries in 2 different locations because of space limitations of our main building. The 3rd service nursery at JQES continues to have strong attendance this year with average attendance of over 12 infants and toddlers. The English service nursery is the second largest, with 10 children registered in the roster. 20 children will be promoted to preschool this fall. By caring for these young children, their parents have the opportunity and peace of mind to attend worship and Sunday School without the distractions of their children.

Kids Worship (9:15-10:30am)

Life Stage: 2 years old to 5th grade

Average attendance: 47

The Kids Worship preschool and elementary teams nurture the faith of children ages two years to grade five by leading them to worship God and preparing them to transition into adult English worship after 5th grade. Basic elements of worship are taught through songs, a Bible message, prayer, crafts, and Scripture reading. Children also volunteer to serve by reading Scripture, praying, and taking offering. We are thankful for the new recruits these past two years from 2nd and 3rd services who have added new enthusiasm and energy to the ministry. We pray for increasing involvement from the Cantonese congregations to love and minister to these precious children.

Sunday School (11:00am-12:30pm)

Life Stage: 2 years old to 5th grade

Average attendance: 100

Young children grow leaps and bounds and in amazing ways. Our teachers work hard to help them learn and love the Word of God, and apply His teachings in their daily lives. The children are also exposed to traditional and contemporary worship songs. Our children had the privilege of sharing the love of Jesus by singing for the elderly at the South Cove Nursing Home and sharing their joy with the English and 2nd services this year.

This summer, the elementary students learned that God is victorious and about the greatness of His salvation. Understanding God's grace and love, we are compelled to share the great news to others. In the summer and throughout the year, the children had opportunities to hear about what God is doing around the world through missionary sharing and lessons in missions.
